From the Pastor:

It is an axiom that applies to just about everything in life: "The better you prepare for something, the better it will be."

How are you preparing for Easter?

Christmas is easy to prepare for; the stores start preparing us for it in early November. And the build up just keeps growing through December. When you think about it, Christmas doesn't need as much preparation. The shepherds had no advanced knowledge and they fully participated in the celebration. True that Mary and Joseph did have months to prepare.

Easter really needs preparation. Jesus spent three years preparing His followers and yet

they struggled greatly to understand what was happening. The women seemed to have a much better understanding of things, even anointing Jesus for burial in the week prior to the Crucifixion. The men only got it after the fact, for some it took days and weeks.

I hope you are participating in the Lenten devotional we are using this year. The passages are not necessarily easy passages to read. In fact they are necessarily difficult passages. Another great way to prepare for Resurrection Sunday is the Tenebrae

service on Maundy
Thursday. The service
begins with communion
and then moves to scripture readings and choral
music in our darkened


We are inviting any crafters from our church that would like to offer their wares, to join us

Courage and Triumph on the Cross

British novelist and poet, Thomas Hardy, once said that "A

look at the best entails a look at the worst." That maxim applies particularly to the Lenten season, when sober midweek reflection over our sins may help us to greet the news of Resurrection Day with joy and gratitude. The same may be said of risking a queasy stomach to learn a bit more about the practice of crucifixion in Jesus's day.

British theologian N. T. Wright* offers these historical details as background for understanding what Jesus endured on the cross: "...the very word 'cross' was a word you would most likely not utter in polite society. ... if you actually had seen a crucifixion or two, your sleep would have been invaded by nightmare...memories of humans half alive and half dead, lingering perhaps for days on end, covered in blood and flies, nibbled by rats, pecked at by crows, with weeping but helpless relatives still keeping watch, and with hostile or mocking crowds adding their insults to the terrible injuries.

"Those who crucified people did so because it was the sharpest and nastiest way of asserting their own absolute power and guaranteeing their victim's absolute degradation. ... Crucifying people beside busy roads was designed to warn any slave or rebel contemplating running away to join a revolt. Routine whipping and scourging before the crucifixion left the victim weakened and publicly humiliated.

"In ancient Galilee the towns and villages where Jesus announced God's kingdom would have had memories of people known, loved, and lost to Roman brutality. When Jesus told his followers to pick up their own crosses and follow Him, they would not have heard this as a metaphor."

The sickening reality of crucifixion in Jesus's day only magnifies the courage of our Savior as He "sets His face to Jerusalem" [Luke 9:51 NSV]. That life-determining decision, and all that transpired along the way, gave and still gives life to all who open their hearts in gratitude to Him. When Jesus can no longer lift himself high enough to fill His lungs with air, He gasps, "It is finished." In that phrase I see both the merciful closure of suffering and a triumphant announcement that the vise grip of Sin has been broken for Israel and all humankind.

Idolatry continues to run rampant in our society, but for the committed believer, the battle was won on that cross so many centuries ago. The struggle to redeem our world continues until Christ returns, and, through the power of the Holy Spirit, we are called as Christ's people to witness against the many idolatrous renditions of sex, money, and power, to name a few of today's challenges.

One of my favorite Lenten hymns, most often sung during our Thursday evening Tenebrae Service, is "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded." The third verse of that hymn expresses the gratitude and love that we should feel every day of our lives. I pray for you and for me that these words will growingly reflect the love that we have for our Savior and Lord:

"What language shall I borrow / To thank Thee, dearest Friend, / For this, Thy dying sorrow, Thy pity without end? /O make me Thine forever; / And should I fainting be, / Lord, let me never, never / Outlive my love to Thee.






Pull Tabs


