

From the Pastor

As you probably know, my New Year got off to a sad start. At 6:30am on January 1 my mother called to tell me that my father had passed away. Dad had been diagnosed with Vascular Dementia and the last years were difficult. Four years ago my brother moved in with my parents to provide care. My sister, who lives an hour away, was over once or twice a week, and I visited when I could (four times in the past 12 months). My dad was under hospice care for the last three months, and was reqularly visited by close friends.

My father had a strong enduring Christian faith, so we celebrate the joy and eternal wellness he is now experiencing. And we look forward to our reunion in heaven.

Over the years of my father's illness I experienced a love and a care within my family that was powerful and reflective of God's love for us. We drew closer together, becoming more gracious toward one another, supportive, caring, and concerned for one another. I know families don't always behave this way, my family didn't always behave this way, but upon my dad's illness my family drew upon our Christian faith and sought to manifest the Fruit of the Spirit in our interactions with one another. Those characteristics of Christian faith and love made a difficult situation, not just tolerable, but

good and frequently joyous.

In the middle of this month love will be expressed with cards, roses, and chocolates, nothing wrong with these, but real love is expressed in fruit; the Fruit of the Spirit.

Thoughts on God's Love and Our Response

- In understanding God's love for us, we need to know the entire story, Old Testament and New. Read as a whole, the Bible is a love letter, written by a passionate God, proclaiming one incessant message: "I love you so much that I broke into your world in the person of my Son, Jesus, to die for you so that you might live forever with me."
- The Lord's love for the underdog is apparent from the beginning. Addressing a new generation of Israelites about to enter the land of their ancestors, Moses says "The Lord did not set His affection on you ... because you were more numerous than other peoples. But it was because the Lord loved you and kept the oath He swore to your ancestors that He redeemed vou from the land of slavery Know therefore that the Lord your God is God; He is the faithful God, keeping His covenant of love to a thousand generations of those who love Him and keep His commandments" [Deut. 7:6-9].
- Packer puts it this way: "God became man; the divine Son became a Jew; the Almighty appeared on earth as a helpless human baby, unable to do more than lie and stare and wriggle and make noises, needing to be fed and changed and taught to talk like any other child...The more you think about it, the more staggering it gets. Noth-

- ing in fiction is so fantastic as is this truth of the Incarnation" [Knowing God, p. 53, as reported. in Timothy Keller, *Hidden Christmas*, p. 44].
- Coming to earth as a fully human being, Jesus hungered, thirsted, experienced temptation, endured ridicule, and suffered agonizing pain on the Cross. Through it all, He obeyed His Father, displaying the faith, love, discipline and courage we need to meet the trials in our lives. He is both the recipient of our love and the model by which we love others.
- Jesus pulled together two Old Testament scriptures to describe "The Great Commandment": "Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these" [Mark 12:29-31].
- Greg Ogden on The Great Commandment: "The purpose of living is the adoration of God and the cherishing of human beings. The Great Commandment is a call to respond to a relationship of love that has already been established. It is not a new high bar for us to jump over so that God will be pleased with us. His pleasure in us has already been demonstrated through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus" [Greg Ogden, The Essential Commandment, p. 27]

- The way in which God came to earth foreshadowed the way that we should model His love. In the words of Timothy Keller, "the fact that God became human and emptied Himself of His glory means you should not want to hang out only with the people with power and glitz, who are networked and can open doors for you. You need to be willing to go to people without power, without beauty, without money. That is the Christian spirit, because God became one of us" [Timothy Keller, Hidden Christmas, 501.
- God's love story is moving toward His return, when He gathers His people and restores the earth to its blissful condition preceding the Fall. We are actors in this story, approaching our day of restoration. As repentant sinners, we should await this day with joy, energy, and determination. We have work to do! We are to take God's Word to our unsaved neighbors, who otherwise face an eternity of isolation from Him and His love. God desires that all be saved. Seeking and discipling others, we follow not only His Great Commandment but also His Great Commission. -Bob Kribbs

Continuing Conversation...

In our continuing conversation about our denomination, we have an opportunity in February to listen to and then discuss the denominational issues with Dr. Steve Shirk.

On Monday Feb. 27 at 7:00pm Rev. Dr. Steve Shirk, Pastor of First Presbyterian of Milton, will be sharing with us. Several years ago the Milton church actually began the process to leave the denomination and then stopped the process midway. Steve will share with us why they began the process, why they stopped, and the impact it has had on their congregation.

The next meeting will be on March 27 with Commissioned Lay Pastor Bob Reich. Bob is Pastor of the Mountain Presbyterian Church (south of Sunbury) which has left the PC (USA) and joined the Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians (ECO).

A stained glass window expert has estimated the cost of repairing and preserving these windows to be about \$70,000. In an effort to make the repairs we have undertaken a three year campaign.
