

#### "Milkshakes"

I've been thinking about ice cream and Father's Day, June 21. From my early days of tagging along with Dad to practices, games, and scouting trips (he was a football and basketball coach), we shared our love for milkshakes. In the 1950s. small-town America served its milkshakes at the local drugstore, dairy store, or ice cream stand. As a ten-yearold, my favorite spot was the counter at the local pharmacy, where the aroma of chocolate mingled with iodine and camphor; a deep-voiced pharmacist mixed medicinal potions with mortar and pestle; and on a sweltering. pre-airconditioning afternoon, one giant ceiling fan throbbed overhead.

Straddling our blackleathered. revolving stools, Dad and I watched as scoop after scoop of rich vanilla ice cream was dropped into silver canisters, chocolate or strawberry flavoring and fullstrength milk were added, and the canisters were attached to a three-unit, pale green, Hamilton-Beach mixer. In two or three minutes our shakes were blended to a thickness that, with some effort, could be drawn through a straw. Each of us had our black plastic holder with its conical paper

What followed was a long silence, punctuated by refilling, until, probing the depths of our cups, we realized that the sweetness in our had straws

turned to air. Time spent with my father was marked by many such silences, but none so mutually satisfying as those in which we shared our passion cream and for ice milk. thickness whipped to and drawn slowly and pleasurably through a straw.

The time that I was privileged to spend with my father, who died at age 50, was his way of telling me that I mattered a great deal to him. We all need someone to open that door for us. The fatherson or parent-child relationship is also the key to understanding our relationship with God. God is our loving Father, and we are His children. It is that simple. Jesus' disciple, John, says it this way: "To all who did receive Him, to those who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God" [John 1:12].

As children of God, we are to trust and obey our Spiritual father as we did our earthly fathers. Have you accepted God as Father? Jesus urges His disciples and us to accept God with the humility and sincerity of a child when He says, "Unless you change and become like little children. you will never enter the kingdom of heaven" [Mt. 18:3]. The stakes are high. You and I matter a great deal to God. Accept Him now and receive daily the assurance and comfort of His unchanging love.



#### I Scream, You Scream, We All Scream For Ice Cream


For many people, summer is synonymous with cool treats.

"I must have eaten 10 tons of ice cream alone in my lifetime," said the late TV commentator Andy Rooney. "It makes life seem long and lovely just thinking about every bite of it."

Doing a little research I found that the Lewisburg area had many 'soda fountains' over the years. For those of you that have lived here 60+ years; do you remember? When Bechtels was downtown in the Mercantile building, Bennett and Moyer's Pharmacy was right next door, both serving ice cream?



There was a Hershey Store located where Wolf Jewelers is now. Rea & Derrick (where Sweet Frog is) and J. J. Newberrys (CVS building) both had lunch



counters that served ice cream. The Sweet Shop was on the Bucknell Campus on St. George Street. Tasty Freeze (or the Freeze now) wasn't the only ice cream shop on Route 15. Before the Freeze, there was the Custard Cup (located on the north west corner of Routes 15 and 45) and the Dixie Cup where Mancini's is now. One could also get ice cream at Dock View Dairy on Route 192 or travel to Mifflinburg to Wehrs Dairy Store or to Milton to Stamm's Dairy or McDaniels.

As you stand in line waiting for that wonderful frozen confection, think about what you "scream for"? Psalm **Bechtels** restaurant 98:3 says "shout for joy to the

98:3 says "shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth, burst into jubilant song with music". Are you that excited about the Lord and all the wonderful things He does? Shout to the Lord and sing His praises!

Dear Congregation Members,

Our church is blessed to offer many youth programs. We have groups that meet regularly (Refuge, Fuel, and JAM) and seasonal offerings (VBS, Christmas Cantata, and youth mission trips). We also provide weekly Sunday School programming for all ages and "child care" during our worship services.

Many of these programs would not be possible without the assistance of adult volunteers. However, becoming an adult volunteer just became more challenging under Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Law (Act 153). Passed in the wake of the Sandusky scandal at Penn State, this new law goes into effect as of July 1, 2015 and requires mandatory training and clearances to supervise youth under the age of 18. Act 153 poses a challenge not only for our church, but also for any and all activities involving adult contact with children—youth sports, school field trips, and even assisting in a classroom. As an adult you will not be able to do any of these things in the future unless you obtain the necessary clearances and training. It is a "new reality" for all of us.

To help ensure our volunteer base at First Presbyterian remains viable, we are asking any adult wishing to become or remain involved in youth activities participate in Department of Human Services approved training and obtain the three required clearances.

1. Free online training can be completed at <u>http://www.reportabusepa.pitt.edu</u>. Print your certificate of completion.

- 2. Pennsylvania State Police Access to Criminal History Check (a.k.a., PATCH Screen)
  - a. <u>https://epatch.state.pa.us/</u>
  - b. Cost: \$10.00
  - c. Print out your record of a completed PATCH check.
- 3. Pennsylvania Department of Human Services Child Abuse History Clearance

a. Create a Child Welfare Portal Account (if you don't already have one) at:

https://www.compass.state.pa.us/CWIS/Public/Home

b. After logging in, select Access My Clearances.

c. At My PA Child Abuse Clearance, select Create Clearance Application and fill it out. (Please note you will be asked to provide all names you have used, all addresses at which you have lived, and all household members with whom you have lived since 1975.)

- d. Cost: \$10.00
- e. Print out your Submission Confirmation page.

\* PLEASE NOTE. If you have been a continuous resident of Pennsylvania for the past 10 years, you may forgo (#4) in lieu of signing a legal affidavit affirming you have not been convicted of any of the disqualifying offenses listed on the document. The affidavit may be obtained from the office, signed and submitted to Rhiannon.

4. FBI Federal Criminal History Check via Fingerprint\*

- a. <u>https://www.pa.cogentid.com</u>
- b. Select Pennsylvania Department of Human Services
- c. Select Register Online and complete the registration form.
- d. Cost: \$25.75

e. Print out your registration. You have 90 days from the date of registration to take it to an approved fingerprint location. (The closest one in the Lewisburg area is the UPS Store at 185 AJK Boulevard.)

The Christian Education of Children and Youth committee has scheduled three workshops to assist people in obtaining these clearances. Sunday, June 7 immediately following worship, Thursday June 11th at 7pm or Monday June 22nd at 2pm. If you have a laptop, please bring it along. 
