From the Pastor

When I think of the 40's I think of WWII and the challenges it presented and sacrifices people made. I think of stories my father told about rationing, scarcity, and people pitching in together. I think of the challenges it presented, how people needed to step up and take on new responsibilities that were out of their comfort zones. What those dark days produced was in Tom Brokaw's words, "The Greatest Generation."

While the church in the Southern Hemisphere is thriving, the church in Western Hemisphere is facing great challenges; practically dead in Europe and facing steady decline in North America. Unfortunately we, as a congregation, are not immune to these patterns.

We are declining, perhaps not as rapidly as some of our neighbors, but we are declining. We are facing challenges of resources, needing people to work together, and to take on additional responsibilities.

I have three optimistic thoughts regarding the challenges we are facing. The wave of young families that have joined our congregation in recent years brings energy and enthusiasm. There is a pattern throughout the Bible of followers of God facing great challenges, not unlike what our nation faced in the early 40's. the end result is people of strong faith. Finally, and most importantly, the church is Christ's bride. Think about the traditional vows taken at weddings. I knew a couple that got married on December 8, 1941; he got a 24-hour pass before being deployed. I met them along with their children and grandchildren, 52 years later. Know that God loves His bride, will care for His bride, and be with His bride through good times and bad.



A Gift from God

In the flurry of preparation that descends on the typical American household at Christmas time, it's not unusual to find under the limbs of the tree a gift that has lost its name tag. After poking and feeling the contours of the package, the giver and recipient are usually identified, and the ceremony resumes. My gift to friends and strangers alike this year is a gift without a name. When my family couldn't discern a giver, we usually said, "It's from Santa!" Since my unauthored gift comes from the Bible, my answer is, "It's from God!"

If the book of Hebrews is as familiar to you as a soft, old sweater, I invite you to don it yet again and feel anew how it is shaped to the contours of your body. If it remains one of those short, unexplored books near the back of the Bible, I invite you to try it on again; time may have helped it to settle more comfortably on your shoulders.

Whether the author of Hebrews is Paul, Luke, Apollos, or Priscilla, Hebrews speaks with stunning relevance to those of us who, like the Jewish Christians of the 1st Century, are tempted to doubt the sufficiency of Jesus Christ as our Savior and our Lord. For the Jewish Christians, temptation lay in clinging to their highly respected Jewish Law. For us, temptation resides in an array of secular, works-oriented ways of thinking. In thirteen carefully reasoned chapters, the writer of Hebrews builds an air-tight case for the superiority, supremacy, and sufficiency of Jesus Christ. He or she then encourages his readers, including us, to hold on to our faith, lift up one another, and look forward to Christ's return.

The true gift within this book is Jesus Christ himself. For centuries, men and women lived under the Old Covenant, a system of ceremonial laws and animal sacrifice intended to prepare the people for the coming of Christ. With Jesus Christ and the New Covenant, shadow has turned into sunlight; rehearsal into opening night. By going to the Cross, Jesus, the new High Priest, has become, for all who confess our sins, a one-time, perfect, and final sacrifice. Through Him we have instant, constant access to our triune God, who lives within us as our Creator, Savior, and Lord.

Take a few minutes daily this month to unplug and unwind with Scripture. Read anew the words of Hebrews 10: 15-16, where the writer recalls the prophetic words of Jeremiah: "This is the covenant I will make with them / after that time, says the Lord. / I will put my laws in their hearts, / and I will write them on their minds. / Their sins and lawless acts / I will remember no more" [Jer. 31:33-4].

As we rejoice anew over God's gift of forgiveness and forgetfulness, may we be spurred on to renewed faith, witness, love, and service—in this Christmas season and in the year to come.

By the grace of God, and with the help of His many servants that contributed their time, talents, and treasures over the past several weeks, and throughout the year, Operation Christmas Child's Susquehanna Valley Team had another GREAT year!

<u>Statistics:</u>

Shoeboxes collected from 8 relay centers (McClure, Williamsport, Paxinos, Bloomsburg-Buckhorn, Richfield, Mifflinburg, plus two new this year at Cogan Station and Watsontown) and the Lewisburg Collection Center = <u>20,677</u>. In 2014 there were 19,495. The 2015 number is an **increase of 1,182 shoeboxes!**

We ran out of trailer space this year! We over-stuffed four trailers and could not fit any more on (can you see us smiling). Those 4 trailers are on their way to Baltimore for processing, and we still have 492 shoeboxes in 30 cartons plus 10 cartons of filler items left to go (can you see us smiling more). Somehow we will find a way to get those gifts to Baltimore in the next two weeks. (God has a plan!)

Shoeboxes donated at First Presbyterian Lewisburg Collection Center = 7,345. Lewisburg 1st Presbyterian Church had a total of 1,040 this year (of which 841 were from shoebox madness.) In 2014 our total was 1,431.

Since the year 2000, a total of 319,263 shoeboxes have been collected in our region and shipped from Lewisburg. We only have records back to 2000, but we know our involvement went back into the mid-1990's. Thanks for all your help, support, prayers, gifts, sweat and smiles !!! Many many volunteers make this mission happen.


